NEW MEMBER SUNDAY March 10

We will welcome new members during the Connections time in the Welcome Center at 10:30am.



Part of the vision process that the church has engaged in over the last year and a half has involved looking at aspects of our history. As you may recall, River Road United Methodist Church began as Broad Street Methodist Church located at the corner of 10th and Broad Street in downtown Richmond. On June 30th, 1859 the cornerstone was laid for the church building, and on March 18th, 1861 the building was dedicated with 165 members. It is interesting to consider that for the majority of our church's life, we were an urban church!

A particularly vibrant time in the life of the church was between 1915-1933 when the church doubled in size from 600 to 1200 members and expanded the building to include 60 additional feet of frontage road on Broad Street (that they paid \$50,000 at the time). This growth was a direct result of the outreach and engagement the church had with the community. Records from that time indicate that community groups utilized the church and ministry programs occurred seven nights a week. These included employment training, night classes (both small groups like Bible Studies and some community groups), sports activities (basketball and volleyball), as well as "wholesome activities" for young men and women to meet. In other words, the church was the recreation and social center as well as the spiritual hub for the community.

I share this because I want us to realize that within our church identity and historical narrative is a willingness to reach out with the gospel and a flexibility to contextualize faith to meet people where they are. The combination of contextualization and outreach is vital as we seek to make disciples in our current location and culture. During the previously mentioned time period, the church served as the hub for community of all sorts-social and spiritual. As we know, times have changed and currently, in our culture people are finding community through all kinds of groups and commitments distinct from the church. In part this is due to a variety of options and more immediate and accessible communication (thanks Instagram and Facebook). But we also have to be honest that at this time in our history we have more "baggage" for people to sift through when they consider becoming a part of the body of Christ. In fact, statistics about the status of religion in America will often talk about the "nones" people who claim no religious affiliation or the "de-churched," people who were a part of a church but have intentionally left. We also have to own the ways in which we have "failed to be an obedient church" as our prayer of confession as part of the Holy Communion liturgy states in how we have excluded people from the community of faith. In other words, it is even more challenging and necessary for us to communicate the compelling reasons for being part of a church community. We have to demonstrate the importance of being a part of a faith community and how it connects us with the Holy Spirit that brought us into being. How being a part of a faith community empowers us to do the work of justice and mercy and reminds us to walk humbly with God no matter where we are walking. Of course, we cannot only say the words but must live out the gospel in the ways that we treat one another. Without the living and breathing reminder of the body of Christbeing part of church-I assure you, we will drift into a less purposeful and more selfcentered way of living in the world. And the world is in need of the light of the world in Jesus more than ever. I encourage us to do the faithful translative work of communicating the importance of faith and community. And most importantly, that we live out authentically what it means to be loved to life by Christ by the ways in which we live with each other.

Capital Campaign Update





RRUMC IS GOING ON A MISSION TRIP TO FLORIDA JULY 21-27

Hurricane Irma has gone but the recovery and repair have not. The week of July 21-27 RRUMC is sending a group of 10+ missioners to the Tampa Bay/St. Pete area to help with urgently needed home repairs. Desda White who is now a Disaster Case Manager for the Florida Conference United Methodist Church made this opportunity known to the Missions Committee. We had been seeking a mission trip for our church family and are so thankful God gave us such a clear answer.

Mission teams are needed to rebuild homes in the St. Pete/Clearwater/Tampa Bay area due to the destruction from hurricane Irma in 2017. Over 100 homes belonging to those living below the poverty level before the storm did not receive help right away or did not have insurance for repair and still desperately need help.

An \$8 million grant will cover supplies and materials. We will fly there, and stay in nearby churches. We plan to fundraise so that money is not an issue to anyone wanting to go. All those 14 years and older are welcome on this trip.

Church Family -

One of our strengths at River Road UMC remains our giving and outreach via a wide variety of missions supported directly by our congregation. As we look back at 2018, here is a quantitative update as to outreach that occurred:

- **\$53,258** in Budgeted Giving. These are funds from our annual operating budget of \$710,000 and are directly allocated towards monetary support of Missions Outreach. \$30,258 supports Missions determined by our Conference as part of our annual apportionment, and an additional \$23,000 for missions determined by our congregation.
- **\$98,850** in Additional Giving from missional appeals to our congregation. Throughout the year, funds and donations of gifts occur. Examples (among a long list of items) of this type of giving include our Church Yard Sale, Ginter Park Food Donations, Thanksgiving Boxes, Gifts for the Manager and sponsoring of a child in Sierra Leone. \$64,600 in funds have been received via these appeals along with an estimated \$34,250 in goods donated.
- **4,600 hours** of time have been given by members of our church in support of the wide variety of missional outreach. Whether time spent with our MICAH schools outreach, CARITAS, Rebuilding Together, Angel Tree or other initiatives it adds up quickly.

These numbers are representative of the ways the Holy Spirit has enabled us to impact the world for good in God's name. The numbers above are just the *tip of the iceberg* in terms of what God does with our willingness to live as stewards of Christ's message into the world. Thank you for all the good works that we do both inside and outside of our congregation to live as Christ in the community and world.
